

CLAPW took a lead on advocacy work around affordable housing and presented to the MPP's Barnes Housing Roundtable and to the Region of Durham's Social Services Committee. CLAPW also led the work around Family Forums that took place over the year in Durham Region. We had two highly successful virtual forums that included presentations from Developmental Services Ontario, Adult Protective Services, Partners for Planning, Micro Boards Ontario, and the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services on Journey to Belonging.

We continue to evolve our supports to ensure that we are delivering the services that people want. As we wrapped up a successful multiyear Strategic Plan, we began the work of creating a new plan to help the organization navigate the many changes that will result from the Journey to Belonging framework developed by the province.

## **VOLUNTEER SERVICES**

Our Ontario Trillium Foundation Grant concluded in June 2023, ending a three-year grant that supported the expansion of CLAPW's Volunteer Services. Over seventy individuals were matched with volunteers to become actively involved in their community, overcome isolation and foster new relationships. Many of the relationships between volunteers and the people we support are still going strong. We have had many volunteers pass through our agency that have gone on to become police officers, doctors and even CLAPW staff.

Taylor Hiebert-Thorne, one of our exceptional volunteers, won the 2023 Ajax Volunteer Award 2023 for the great work she did enhancing supports and engaging community for an individual living in Accommodation Services. She accepted her award in December with Ann by her side.



CLAPW has also expanded its engagement

with local colleges, resulting in such high demand for students that we now have a waitlist. We host 12-25 students per-semester from the Developmental Service Worker and Social Service Worker Programs at Durham College, Centennial College, Fanshawe College and George Brown College amongst others.





## SUPPORTED EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

The Supported Employment Program (SEP) at CLAPW has experienced a transformative and impactful year, filled with notable achievements and growth. For starters, our staff actively participated in various events, setting up informative tables to showcase our comprehensive services. To enhance our service delivery, the team attended the Ontario Disability Employment Network's (ODEN) webinars and engaged in networking opportunities at Ajax-Pickering Board of Trade and Whitby Chamber of Commerce events. Staff members also consistently participated in monthly socials for program participants, promoting a sense of community and support. A notable accomplishment was our involvement in numerous integrated transition planning meetings with the Durham District Catholic School Board, where we assisted families in understanding and navigating the post-secondary school transition process with Developmental Services Ontario (the DSO).

Our commitment to inclusivity was recognized when the Region of Durham awarded the SEP the 2023 Accessibility Award, a testament to our ongoing efforts to create an accessible and inclusive work environment. We're proud to highlight that one of our participants, new in her job, received a shout-out award for her reliability, dedication, and friendliness, showcasing her commitment to her employer.

In terms of employment outcomes, we've made some progress with one new job startup and four job interviews attended by our program participants. While these numbers reflect ongoing efforts, we recognize there's room for growth and are committed to increasing the number of successful placements in the coming year.

Looking ahead, we're excited about several new developments in our employment services. Our staff recently attended the "Cutting Edge Job Development" training session by Bob Vansickle Training and Consulting, which has inspired us to initiate a rebranding of our employment services.

We've begun planning fee-for-service employment training sessions specifically designed for high school students and recent graduates. In our efforts to expand our reach and impact, CLAPW has partnered with two agencies that have existing connections with businesses and employers: the Canadian Council on Rehabilitation and Work (CCRW) and Ready, Willing, and Able (RWA). These partnerships will allow us to receive job opportunities that these agencies are unable to fill, further enhancing our ability to connect our participants with suitable employment options. These initiatives demonstrate our commitment to continually improving and expanding our services to meet the evolving needs of our community.

## **ACCOMMODATION SUPPORTS**

We have continued to expand our services in Accommodation Supports, primarily through the growth of our Supported Independent Living (SIL) program. We began serving two new individuals over the past year and have seen an increase in the number of younger people seeking supports through this program. We strengthened our partnership with Cormack Station in Whitby and secured an on-site SIL office which has helped us to enhance our support. We have seen an increase in the number of SIL staff enabling us to better meet the needs of the people supported. We also unfortunately lost one of our supported individuals, Rodney Turpin, who sadly and unexpectedly passed away in the summer of 2023. Rodney had been supported by CLAPW since the early 1980's. He had a wonderful sense of humour and was very well-liked by all who knew him. He is deeply missed by his many friends and the SIL team.

Through our Intensive Supports Services, we have seen people reconnecting with their families. Whether for special events such as milestone birthdays or just day-to-day interactions, family support is invaluable for creating good lives for people.

We had movement within our Group Living Services impacting our Harman, Cochrane, Pringle and Applewood locations. We were pleased to welcome people from the Treatment Home to our group living settings, Harman and Pringle. We also welcomed people from the Urgent Response Program (Applewood). We sadly lost John Brown, a person who had been supported by CLAPW since the mid 1980's. He was supported beautifully by the team at our Cochrane location as he began palliative care. The team were strong advocates and compassionate caregivers who helped John transition in the comfort of his home.

We continued our focus on helping people set achievable and inspiring goals through the individual support planning process. Last April, an individual at the Kirby location was accompanied by a support staff to Jamaica for a week. This was a goal the individual dreamed of, and it happened! Another person saved her money and purchased a tablet, something she had wanted for a while. One gentleman was immensely proud to join the Knights of Columbus. Our staff teams are committed to helping people enjoy authentic inclusion based on their own dreams and goals.

We have seen the expansion of our Host Family Program with two new individuals and families joining this service. This expansion was due to young people aging out of the Foster Care Program, and transitioning to our agency. We are happy to support the transition that allows these individuals to continue to live with their foster families and to maintain the activities and life they choose to have. CLAPW supports 5 Host Families and anticipates further expansion of this service.

Throughout the year, people enjoyed reconnecting and exploring all the community has to offer. We thank our dedicated and creative staff teams as they support people to have good, fulfilling lives.

#### **URGENT RESPONSE**

Urgent Response is a time-limited, collaborative, and goaloriented process delivered to access, navigate, plan, coordinate, and develop options for services and supports required to achieve temporary or long-term mitigation of unmet urgent needs.

There were 36 people supported through Urgent Response (UR) over the course of the fiscal year. The majority of the people referred to UR are in need of accommodation supports. This need has been met in a variety of ways, including existing funded vacancies, use of outside paid resources and intensive planning through the Multi-Year Supportive Living Planning by agencies with MCCSS.

Each of the individuals involved in UR had a wrap-around support plan with all the community resources required to stabilize and mitigate their urgent situations. It is truly a collaborative approach with involvement from the Durham Community Response Committee, Adult Protective Service Workers and local community agencies working together to prioritise and problemsolve.

The demand for services continues to outpace availability in the community, making this a very busy service.

## PASSPORT UPDATE



### **PASSPORT UPDATE**

The Passport Program has gone through many changes this past year. The new guidelines came into effect April 1, 2023., making some items covered by Passports through Covid permanent, with some amount restrictions. It took some time to assist our Passport customers with understanding and navigating the new guidelines.

We took on more than 25 new Passport customers, and brokered for 99 people throughout 2023-2024. Despite having had Passport Funding for a while, numerous customers we took on were not utilizing it, due to difficulties navigating the Passport One system; it was great to see them now using their funding with our assistance. We also focused on working with existing customers to help them better spend their funding by connecting them with programs and activities in the community.

It has been very encouraging to see individuals who had not been fully utilizing their funding now using it to engage in activities that have truly enriched their lives, and for many, helped them to develop more independence.

One of our Passport customers used his Passport Funding to participate in a group where he developed skills that have helped him to become more independent. He participated in cooking classes and activities in the community that have increased his social connections and skills. He now possesses the confidence to try new things, has a contract worker who assists him with trying new activities, and works part-time. Another Passport customer used

her funding to take art classes where she has developed her painting skills and has been able to make a little money by selling some of her paintings.

Others used their funding to accomplish their goals of going to a Bryan Adams concert, the Aquarium, Fan Expo, and Cirque Du Soleil, to name just a few activities.

The Passport Program continues to grow; a designated Passport Coordinator was appointed in November, 2023, and plans were put in place to hire a Passport assistant in April-May, 2024.

### FAMILIES AS PARTNERS GROUP

At the CLAPW AGM in September 2023, we reintroduced the 'Family as Partners' support group. The group had started prior to the pandemic with a grant from the Town of Ajax, and was resurrected in September 2023 when we could resume meeting in-person.

My name is Sylvia Thornton, and I have taken the parent lead role of this group, which was supported in the 2023-2024 fiscal year with a grant from the Ontario Caregivers Organization. I am also pleased to be supported by CLAPW Case Manager Wendy Holliday, as we navigate how, as parents/caregivers, we can prepare for our loved one's future.

At the 2023 AGM we were able to sign up six families who were interested in joining this group. Our first meeting in October proved to be an exciting one as

caregivers put forth their vision for their loved one's future. Our members are fully engaged in our discussions and are passionate caregiver advocates. By the end of six months, we had grown to twenty-five families.

We will continue to hold monthly meetings the third Wednesday of each month (except for July and August). I have no doubt that we can grow this Family Network Group as there is an important need in the Durham Region for families to connect.
