WE WILL REMEMBER


Rajesh Naipaul Singh ("Glenn")

SUPPORTED EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

Path to Employment: A Successful Start

The Employment Program has proudly completed three full sessions of our new Path to Employment course—two in the summer and one in the fall. This innovative program has been well-received, and we're excited to continue offering it multiple times a year as a fee-for-service opportunity.

About the Course

Designed by our employment staff, this course aims to equip individuals with disabilities, who are not currently part of a DSO-supported employment program, with the essential skills needed to find and maintain a job. The curriculum covers a wide range of

practical and relevant topics, including: workplace accommodations, managing money and banking, hygiene in the workplace, interview skills, understanding employment impacts on ODSP, punctuality and accountability, resume building, rights training, social media safety, social skills in the workplace, travel and transit safety, skills and personality assessments, and self-directed employment discovery.

An Engaging Learning Experience

To accommodate diverse learning styles, the course incorporates PowerPoint presentations, videos, group discussions, and individual worksheets. Participants receive printed modules, activity sheets for in-class and at-home practice, and certificates of completion at the end of the course.

A Program Built on Success


The Path to Employment course has already demonstrated its impact, with participants achieving significant progress throughout the week-long program. We're incredibly proud of their hard work and dedication.






















HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS

Preventing Slips, Trips, and Falls

Slips, trips, and falls are a common and serious workplace hazard that can lead to debilitating injuries and lost workdays. Statistics show that the majority (67%) of falls happen on the same level resulting from slips and trips. This is not just a workplace issue, but can present a hazard for anyone, particularly people with mobility challenges

Slips

Slips happen where there is too little friction or traction between the footwear and the walking surface. Common causes of slips are:

- · wet or oily surfaces
- · occasional spills
- · weather hazards (think snow and ice)
- · loose, unanchored rugs or mats
- · flooring or other walking surfaces that do not have the same degree of traction in all areas

Trips

Trips happen when your foot collides (strikes, hits) an object causing you to lose balance and, eventually fall. Common causes of tripping are:

- · obstructed view
- · poor lighting
- · clutter in your way
- · wrinkled carpeting
- · uncovered cables
- · bottom drawers not being closed
- · uneven (steps, thresholds) walking surfaces

How to prevent falls due to slips and trips?

- · cleaning all spills or debris immediately
- \cdot marking spills and wet areas
- · removing obstacles from walkwa<mark>ys and always keeping walkways fr</mark>ee of clutter
- · securing (tacking, taping, etc.) mats, rugs and carpets that do not lay flat
- · always closing file cabinet or storage drawers

Preventing Slips, Trips, and Falls

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How to prevent falls due to slips and trips? (continued)

- · covering cables that cross walkways
- · keeping working areas and walkways well lit
- · replacing used light bulbs
- · taking your time and paying attention to where you are going
- · adjusting your stride to a pace that is suitable for the walking surface and the tasks you are doing
- · walking with the feet pointed slightly outward
- · making wide turns at corners
- · using a flashlight if you enter a dark room / area where there is no light
- · making sure that things you are carrying or pushing do not obstruct your view.

Footwear

Properly fitting footwear increases comfort and prevents fatigue which, in turn, improves safety for our employees at CLAPW. Employees must follow CLAPW's Policy P 4.13, Dress Code, with regard to footwear: All employees and volunteers are responsible for wearing proper footwear when performing their duties. Employees and volunteers providing direct support to individuals must wear non-slip closed toe shoes. Employees/volunteers are responsible for ensuring that all protective equipment and safety shoes, as provided by the employer, are worn where applicable as per the Ontario Occupation Health and Safety Act. These considerations keep people safe at work and are also relevant for people outside of the work context.

ADVOCACY ALLIANCE: A YEAR OF IMPACT AND EMPOWERMENT

In March 2024, the self-advocacy group **Advocacy Alliance** reconvened with a renewed sense of purpose and a vision to amplify the voices of individuals living with disabilities. Since then, the group has achieved an impressive series of milestones, proving that determination and collaboration can bring about meaningful change.

The advocates have actively engaged with decision-makers, starting with a visit to the legislature to discuss pressing issues affecting the disability community. This was followed by a meeting with the Mayor of Ajax, where they shared their goals and challenges, fostering a stronger relationship between local government and their cause.

Their efforts didn't stop at advocacy meetings. The group also participated in numerous fundraising and social events, strengthening community ties and raising awareness about the importance of self-advocacy. Notably, they connected with an advocacy group in Ireland to discuss healthcare rights for people with disabilities, exchanging ideas and strategies on a global scale.

The pinnacle of their year was their participation in a world convention for people with disabilities and their rights. The event allowed the Advocacy Alliance to showcase their work on an international stage, solidifying their role as global advocates for change.

Back at home, the group collaborated with the **Spread the Word Committee**, a team of Durham College students dedicated to promoting inclusion and awareness. Together, they worked on projects aimed at breaking down societal barriers and creating a more equitable future.

Currently, the Advocacy Alliance is gearing up for their next big initiative: a Holiday Market. This festive event is designed to raise funds that will support their ongoing advocacy efforts. The market will feature local vendors, handcrafted goods, and a celebration of community spirit, all while emphasizing the importance of empowering individuals with disabilities to lead the charge in creating a more inclusive world.

The Advocacy Alliance's journey over the past year is a testament to the power of self-advocacy and collective action. Through their work, they continue to inspire others to stand up for their rights and the rights of all people living with disabilities.


WELCOME


