

President's Report



l o say that this has been both a very fine year and yet an unusual year since our 2019 AGM, would be an understatement on both counts!

At the Board level, we said goodbye to our very capable Treasurer Ms Deborah Price. From the outset, Deborah took on the task of getting our financial books in order and, with the capable assistance of our CLAPW staff did a most remarkable job. We welcomed Mr. Jerry Rozeluk to the Board.

Jerry is a retired CPA and immediately took over the role of treasurer. In addition, we welcomed Ms Andrea Kennedy to the Board as well. Andrea brings a wealth of experience from the world of marketing and public relations.

There has been so much that has happened since our last AGM. We had our first, and hopefully annual, CLAPW Garden Contest. I was honored to be a judge and I must say that the competition was great.

In August, we had an excellent Compliance Review by the Ministry. Our redevelopment of programming offered at our Dowty Road Participation Center continues to evolve; it included a fee for service component this year.

In order to augment our programing, we received a Durham Community Foundation grant for the establishment of our cooking program at Dowty and an impact grant from the Town of Ajax for our gardening program at Dowty.



President's Report

We were pleased to initiate the "Families as Partners" group which was established due to a second impact grant from the Town of Ajax. It is our hope that this group flourishes.

On the provincial level, we rejoined Community Living Ontario after being away from the group for the past several years. Finally, we launched our new CLAPW website. Have you visited it yet?

And then the Covid 19 pandemic hit! Much changed.

Lead by our Executive Director, Lisa McNee-Baker, and her very capable team of Managers, we have been able to deal with this pandemic very well thus far. As early as February, Lisa effected our pandemic policy and immediately put into place a number of measures to help mitigate this crisis. Of course the safety of our supported people and our staff has been paramount. A lot has been done to keep the people in our organization safe and Lisa and her staff continue to be vigilant and to follow the guidelines as have been set out by the Ministry.

We do not know what the future holds of course but with this pandemic, going forward, there is even a greater deal of uncertainty. However, we do know that our organization is in great hands under the leadership of Lisa and her management team.







GLAPW has continued its focus on transforming services, modernizing our approaches and diligently working through the various aspects of our strategic plan to move the agency forward so that we can successfully implement our mission while adhering to our vision and values.

The agency undertook a branding exercise to heighten community awareness about our agency and the services we provide. We created print materials, installed new signage at Dowty Road and refreshed our website. We worked hard to increase our social media presence by using the Facebook, Instagram and Twitter platforms. We are proud of the services we deliver and want to make sure that others are aware of our — impact on the lives of the people we support.

As a result of an Impact Grant from the Town of Ajax we created beautiful gardens at Dowty Street. Butterfly and pollinator plants were installed at the front of the building and vegetables and herbs were grown at the back of the building. Some of the fruit, veggies and herbs grown in the garden were used in the cooking program. There is something very satisfying about growing your own food.

The Mayor of Ajax, Town and Regional Councilors were on hand as we opened our garden and provided tours of our revitalized programming area at 177 Dowty Road.

The Town of Ajax also provided a grant so that we could start a parents group. Families as Partners provides a forum for parents to gather and explore options for their sons and daughters to become fully engaged in the community. The program began early in 2020 and we are excited to expand it in the coming years. Historically parent groups have been a very important part of the culture at CLAPW and we are pleased to once again be partnering with family members.

Executive Director's Report


The Durham Community Foundation provided a grant to expand the cooking programs at the Dowty Road. The grant was to help people learn to prepare healthy snacks and meals and to help people learn about the aspects of healthy eating and shopping on a budget. This incredibly progressive foundation gave us permission to use the funds as we most needed them at the onset of the Covid 19 Pandemic. We are optimistic that in time we will be able to implement the cooking/nutrition program as we conceived it.

We were pleased in the summer of 2019 to have an excellent compliance review conducted by MCCSS. The hard work of our leadership team and our direct support professionals have certainly paid off with only a couple of minor issues identified through the assessment.

With the creation of "The Culture Club" a task group of CLAPW employees that focused on enhancing the workplace culture a number of events and initiatives were created. There was a Mad Hatter Tea Party, Gardening Contest, Amazing Race/Scavenger Hunt, Lip Sync Contests, Surveys, Pancake breakfasts informal dinner gatherings and a new "Cheers for Peers" employee of the month program. We have an amazing group of staff members at CLAPW and we are pleased to be able to celebrate their contributions. We implemented a fee for service at our day program. This was necessary as we have lost the revenue that used to be generated at Arc Industries and the costs associated with our new programming format are not fully covered by our provincial funding. At the same time, we created a subsidy policy to ensure that those families that needed financial assistance would be able to receive it.


To close out 2019 we had a wonderfully successful Christmas Dance at the Ajax Convention Centre. We had the largest turn out we have ever had at a Christmas dance. It was a celebration of a fantastic year!

And just as we were ready to wrap up our final quarter in early March, we were thrust into the chaos created by the global pandemic caused by Covid 19. Although it will take time to assess the full impact of the pandemic and the many changes and restrictions caused by it, what is clear is that CLAPW could not be better positioned to weather such a challenging situation. Our leadership team is strong and our direct support staff are committed and dedicated to ensuring the safety of the people we support. While COVID 19 will undoubtedly be a historical test of our perseverance and resolve, it is certain that the CLAPW families, staff and volunteers will do everything the can to ensure the safety and well-being of the people supported by the agency.











Community Participation

Expressive Art is one of many social and interactive programs run out of Dowty Rd Community Participation Program. Art can be a very important way in communicating a variety of emotions and feelings. Participants are encouraged to create work in a variety of forms. A general framework of a project may be provided as a guide and we wait for the magic of expression to present itself. Self expression is a powerful and wonderful thing, it is typically an amazing journey! Listening and watching someone take that journey becomes a privilege and rewarding experience for all involved but most importantly for the artist.

Participants are encouraged to discuss and display their work and feelings of pride, accomplishment and self worth are evident. Community involvement is an important part of the Community Participation Program. We were supported by the Ajax Public Library to host an exhibition of participant art. The excitement in the room was contagious and people were simply beaming to see their art hung in a public place and on display for the community to enjoy. All artists hold a special place for that memory of their first art show, it is an incredible sense of accomplishment.





We are very appreciative of being able to take advantage of the skills of community volunteers who have made a huge difference to the participants in our programs. Our arts-based program is one of our most popular and through the results of our efforts we have transformed the space at Dowty and have helped people to discover talents they didn't know they had. It has been amazing to witness this special transformation from what we were to what we are guickly becoming. Assisting the people involved in our Community Participation Program to have meaningful and productive days that bring them joy and a sense of accomplishment has become our new focus. CLAPW Gives Back

CLAPW's Don Albert Aktion Club has been working hard to find various ways to give back.

Our summer BBQ fundraiser in July 2019 raised over \$250!
